

The Problem

Essential workers are being priced out of the very communities they serve.

Teachers, nurses, first responders, aged-care and childcare workers - the backbone of our region face an impossible choice: remain under immense housing stress or leave the region they love.

High rents. Low vacancies. Long commutes.

The ripple effects are severe:

- Schools and hospitals stretched thin.
- Families uprooted, bonds broken.
- Rising stress and poorer health outcomes.
- Weakened community wellbeing.

Housing stress is more than an economic issue. It's a human challenge that touches every classroom, every hospital, every police station and every family.

The Solution - A Place to Call Home

The Collective Impact, is delivering affordable, safe, and stable homes exclusively for essential workers - ensuring they can continue to live locally and serve locally.

These homes are not just bricks and mortar. They represent:

- Accommodation: secure housing that provides dignity.
- Employment: enabling staff to remain close to their workplaces.
- Health & Wellbeing: reducing stress, protecting mental health, and creating stability.
- Opportunity & Choice: giving families the chance to thrive in their own community.

The Transformation

When essential workers can live where they serve, communities flourish.

- For our schools: A teacher can finish their lesson, greet their own children at the school gate, and head home just minutes away - no more choosing between students and family.
- For our hospitals and aged care homes: A nurse ends a 10-hour night shift and drives five minutes home, not an hour. Patients see familiar faces every day, cared for by staff who can afford to stay local.
- For our region: We move from fragility to resilience - our essential services supported, our community thriving.

This is more than housing. It's dignity. It's care. It's connection.







Site Spotlight – Moss Vale

Investing in People

Since 2021, The Collective Impact Community Grants Program has empowered local organisations to create lasting change for the people who need it most. What makes this program powerful is simple: behind every grant are everyday people - volunteers, coaches, carers, and community leaders - working together to make a difference.

Through this program, we reinvest directly back into our region, building lasting partnerships with not-for-profits and grassroots groups. Together, we're not just funding projects - we're strengthening the backbone of the Southern Highlands and Tablelands.

Our Impact

Over the past five years, more than \$194,000 has been awarded to 26 community organisations. Grants range from \$700 to \$10,000, with biannual rounds of \$25,000 ensuring that support remains ongoing and accessible.

Our recipients reflect the diversity of our community:

- Parent and Citizen associations building brighter school futures.
- Sports clubs fostering teamwork and wellbeing.
- Hospital Foundations improving care.
- Music ensembles enriching culture.
- Aged care, health and disability services ensuring dignity and inclusion.

Every grant is an investment in people. Each outcome is a story of resilience, belonging, and hope. Together, we're creating ripples of change that will last for generations.

FY2025 Highlights

In FY2025, \$43,413 was awarded to six organisations, each responding to a real community need:

- Moss Vale Basketball Club spectator seating improvements.
- Moss Vale High School P&C sports oval weather shelter.
- Southern Highlands Botanic Gardens e-cart for mobility access.
- Southern Highlands Off-Road Remote-Control Car Club (SHORRCCC) - electricity installation for a dedicated clubhouse.
- Bundanoon Community Gardens accessible garden pathway.
- Can Assist Southern Highlands client wellbeing support.

Cultivating Connection and Sustainability

Background

The Southern Highlands Botanic Gardens in Bowral is more than a collection of plants. They are a living classroom, a place of reflection, and a gathering space that strengthens community pride. Yet for many older residents and volunteers, mobility across the expansive site was a challenge. Without reliable transport, some could not fully take part in the life of the gardens.

Solution

In 2025, the Gardens introduced a new E-Cart, funded through a combination of community fundraising and a \$10,000 Collective Impact Community Grant. The E-Cart allows people of all ages and abilities to explore the grounds - whether enjoying a peaceful visit, attending events, or volunteering alongside friends.

Impact

The E-Cart has become more than transport. It has become a bridge – removing barriers and opening opportunities for participation. By improving access, it ensures the gardens remain a place where the whole community can belong.

- Health & Wellbeing: Greater accessibility means more residents can experience the physical and mental health benefits of time in nature.
- Community Connection: Volunteers and visitors can move freely, strengthening relationships and shared experiences.
- Sustainability: The Gardens' vision of caring for people and the environment is supported through inclusive, low-impact technology.

CASE STUDY TWO

Southern Highlands Off-Road Remote-Control Car Club (SHORRCCC)

Racing Toward Connection and Belonging

Background

For the Southern Highlands Off-Road Remote-Control Car Club (SHORRCCC), connection looks like a dirt track, a fleet of trucks, and a community that comes together not just to race, but to belong. As the club grew, so too did its needs. Electricity demands, equipment for newcomers, and opportunities for young rookies required more than passion alone.

Solution

With the support of a Collective Impact Community Grant, SHORRCCC has been able to:


- Grow its largest-ever line-up of rookies.
- Invest in hire trucks for newcomers.
- Power the track all day long with upgraded electricity infrastructure.

Impact

What may appear to be simple racing is, in reality, a platform for community. Every meet is filled with laughter, mentoring, and friendly competition. The roar of cars is matched by the joy of connection young people discovering new passions, parents bonding with children, and people of all abilities finding their place in the crowd.

- Health & Wellbeing: A safe, positive outlet for energy and creativity and encouraging young people off devices and outdoors.
- Youth Engagement: Pathways for young people to build skills, confidence, and friendships.
- Community Belonging: A welcoming space where families and individuals connect through shared interests.

Investing in Potential

Launched in 2025, the Community Bank BDCU Scholarship Program represents a \$250,000 investment over five years – \$50,000 each year – to support local TAFE students, apprentices, and healthcare workers.

The program is designed to ease financial pressure and open doors:

- TAFE and Apprentice Scholarships provide direct support for individuals over 16 living or working in the region, covering course fees and essential costs.
- Health & Wellbeing Scholarships award up to \$5,000 each to healthcare workers, enabling continued professional development while serving our community.

The First Recipients

The first Scholarships were awarded in early 2025 following a competitive application process. The response was inspiring – applications reflected the dedication, ambition, and resilience of young people and healthcare professionals across the Southern Highlands and Tablelands.

Will Burke: Building His Future

If you want to master a trade, you learn from the best. That's exactly what Will Burke is doing.

A Moss Vale local and third-year apprentice at Rofe Build, Will trains under Billy and Shane Rofe - renowned names in high-end craftsmanship and some of the most sought-after builds in the Southern Highlands.

Will's passion for construction began at Chevalier College, where he first picked up the tools and set his sights on a career in building. Today, he's on-site, hands-on, and honing the skills that turn good tradies into great ones.

With support from a Community Bank BDCU Scholarship, Will has been able to upgrade his



toolkit with specialist equipment - ensuring he's always site-ready, confident, and capable of tackling the next challenge.

From Winter Warmers to Scam Awareness to Do Good This Christmas, we make community resilience real. Values in action, year-round.

Scam Awareness Seminars

Spot the Signs – Keep What's Yours

"Mum hung up on a fake 'bank' call - and saved thousands." – Attendee, Goulburn

As online threats grow, we won't let our community face them alone.

This year, we expanded our Scam Awareness seminar program across branches, libraries and community halls - plain-English sessions that help people spot red flags, protect personal details, lock down devices and get help fast.

The result: 29 seminars delivered, 690 locals protected in FY2025, and more than 1,450 people reached since inception. With the average scam loss in 2025 estimated at about \$1,668 per person, that knowledge adds up to roughly \$1.1 million in potential harm avoided for our region (illustrative estimate based on average losses; not a prediction or guarantee).

We meet people where they are – older residents navigating texts and emails, small-business owners facing invoice fraud, and families teaching teens to stay safe online. Every seminar ends with practical next steps, trusted contacts and confidence. Not just awareness, real-world protection.

From Pantry to Plate. With Dignity.

When the cold bites, our community steps up. For five years, our Winter Warmer Appeal has rallied the Southern Highlands and Tablelands to share quality pre-loved coats, blankets and essentials with people doing it tough. This year, we widened the circle of care to meet a more urgent need: non-perishable food – so families could put meals on the table.

The response was heartening: 335 items collected and distributed. More than 150 items were donated across our three Community Bank BDCU branches, with a further 180 items from the generous staff at Tyree. The Moss Vale CWA also made a special contribution to local donations. In total, that's about \$1,225 in food shared with community organisations, plus \$180 in cash converted to Everyday Essentials vouchers – practical help delivered with dignity.

Donations were distributed through trusted local partners, including Goulburn Anglicare, Moss Vale St Vinnies, Soul Warmers Co-Op (Mittagong), Food Aid Community Pantry (Moss Vale), Uniting Church Community Pantry (Bowral) and Southern Highlands Community Centres (Bowral). Their week-in, week-out effort - volunteers, logistics, coordination - is nothing short of extraordinary.

Do Good This Christmas Appeal.

Local Kindness. Lasting Impact.

For many in our community, Christmas can be the hardest time of year. Since 2016, Do Good This Christmas has offered a simple plan with a big result: donate a gift at our Community Bank BDCU giving trees in Bowral, Moss Vale and Goulburn; our team wraps each one; trusted partners and local agencies place them in the hands of children across the Southern Highlands and Tablelands.

This tradition now reaches beyond presents. We proudly support the Highlands Community Christmas Dinner - a table where everyone belongs. Our team volunteers alongside community groups to serve a classic Christmas meal and, more importantly, a sense of togetherness and care.

This season's impact: 500 gifts shared (in-kind social impact of ~\$15,000), touching 200 lives with dignity and delight. Small acts, strong community.

In every community, there are moments when an extra pair of hands means everything. That's why the BDCU Group gives every employee at least one paid day each year to volunteer with the organisations and causes they care about. The plan is simple and practical: make time, show up, and put skills to work where they matter most.

In FY2025, our people turned that plan into impact: 280.5 hours of corporate volunteering, contributed by 28 staff volunteers, with an in-kind social impact of ~\$13,912. From blood donations and Meals on Wheels, to packing and delivering kids' care packs to Bowral and Goulburn Hospitals, supporting Riding for the Disabled, and pitching in at local fundraisers, school initiatives and Community Christmas activities – our team met community needs with action.

For staff, it's more than a day out of the office; it's purpose in practice. For the community, it's practical help delivered with dignity. Not just volunteering - skills applied where they're needed most.

While many in our community gathered at home, frontline teams were on shift - keeping people safe, cared for and connected. On Christmas Eve 2024, we delivered 200 locally sourced gifts to first responders, aged care staff and emergency ward teams across the Highlands and Tablelands.
